The Ever-changing Coast

Why was there a Roman fort by Hazlewood Marshes? How could Anglo Saxon ancestors get great ships to Snape to bury their precious dead? Where did the rest of Aldeburgh's market place go? What happened to its Tudor port, The

Haven? Or to Slaughden's busy fishing village, quays and Three Mariners Inn? Did canons really line the beach and how could it

afford to send three great ships to fight the Spanish Armada in 1588? Aldeburgh's coastline is a fragile one. Protected by significant sea defences and now in a designated Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, with many Alde Estuary/marshland highlighted as Sites of Special Scientific Interest (SSSIs), Aldeburgh looks very different to the place our ancestors knew.

Moot Hall Museum

Newson Garrett (1812-1893), son of Leiston agricultural engineering giant, Richard Garrett, returned from London in 1840. He owned Aldeburgh brickworks, bought a Snape merchants/shipping business, built a maltings there, doubled its size, and immersed himself in Aldeburgh life (Mayor, Alderman, JP, town's first County Councillor). He revitalised the Regency resort by enticing the railway (via his Snape maltings!) and together with Peter Bruff (engineer/developer of the north Essex coast) planned its extension...

'Aldeburgh New Town' was to be an 'all mod-cons', 1880s des-res estate on Town Marsh Hill. Land was drained, trees were planted, but properties were only built years later, mainly for Newson's talented offspring. Today, with its mature trees and grand villas Aldeburgh Park Estate is perhaps one of the town's best-kept secrets.

Benjamin Britten (1913-1976), the Lowestoft-born composer put the town on the world map with his music festival and concert hall. From 'Young Person's Guide to the Orchestra' to 'Peter Grimes', he drew inspiration from its coast, countryside and long-lost sons. In Maggi Hambling's 'Scallop' memorial to Britten on the beach, the haunting words of local poet George Crabbe, later reimagined by Britten, are brought home to stir up conversations in others. Was it coincidence, fate or fortune

that Crabbe's house became Newson Garrett's first Aldeburgh home? Or that Newson's maltings became Britten's concert hall? Ah, that's shape-shifting Aldeburgh!
